ABOUT

Grace House Community Centre is a non religious, non political Cambodian NGO and charitable trust in England and Wales under the name Grace House Cambodia Trust registration no. 1155678. Situated 4 km outside of Siem Reap, on the road to Tonle Sap, the local population make a subsistence living from farming and fishing. Little of the wealth generated by the tourist trade finding its way to the poorer farming communities.

Grace House is seeking to address this imbalance for these rural villages by providing access to:-

Education,

Family Support, Health Care
Vocational Training and Social Enterprise

EDUCATION

Education

It has been a year of achievements for the Education programme. The Ministry of Education endorsed our English language programme enabling our students to graduate with certificates stamped and approved by the ministry.

Experienced teaching volunteers enhanced our young children's curriculum and make improvements to the middle school curriculum. The older students programme was redefined after input from the students. The new programme is more age relevant and in the final 2 years concentrates on careers, study and life skills.

This year shows the largest number of students entering university. In total 19 students are now fully or partly sponsored by GHCC in university. 70 new students started English in pre-school and the lower classes, bringing the average daily attendance up to 265 students.

Staffing has remained stable and one new post Volunteer Coordinator / English Language Teacher was created. This role provides better support for the volunteers and a higher level of English to eldest students.

Open Day

In November GHCC celebrated its 5th birthday with an Open day for the parents, supports and village officials. The children were awarded certificates and performed songs and plays for the audience.



Staff Training and Networking

GHCC believes strongly in providing staff with the skills needed to perform well in their chosen careers. Three of the teachers are sponsored by GHCC at university. The office administrator is studying an accounting degree and one social worker has completed a 6 month course on Child



Protection with First Steps NGO. The education manager is studying a MA in project management to enhance his leadership and management skills.

The teachers attended the IELTS (Teaching English as a Second Language) conference in Phnom Penh and a short course in Using Art in the Classroom. Experienced volunteer teachers shared their skills at lunch time workshops and in house training days. The social workers participate in a monthly networking meeting which enables skill sharing with other NGOs working with disadvantaged children in Siem Reap.

FAMILY SUPPORT AND HEALTH CARE



Disability Programme

The Day Centre for Children with Disabilities is providing educational, therapeutic play and social activities for 9 children. Physiotherapist and Occupational Therapy volunteers have provided a service to the children and adults with disabilities. Several homes have been adapted to make life easier for people with disabilities living in the community. One child from the day centre started state school half day, accompanied by a support worker from Grace House.

keep the children in school and prevent them being placed in orphanages. Poverty is the major cause quoted by families placing their need adult services next year as they children in orphanage. UNICEF estimate 70% of children in Cambodian orphanages have one living parent. In several of the families we support the grandparents Ensuring families have a safe and are the main carers as the parents have left the area or are working in Thailand. The gift of rice, school supplies and other basic necessities helps to keep the family together. Our family sponsorship scheme funds sockets. Where access to electricity the majority of this work. Thank you.

GHCC provides micro loans to parents enabling them to establish small businesses, purchase livestock or seeds. In 2013 5 new loans were awarded. 9 out of 10 loans are repaid.

The social workers took many children to hospital over the year but we have used the local government

We continue to work with families to clinic for minor problems. Two of teenagers have ongoing health issues which are currently managed by Angkor Hospital for Children but will will be over 15. Health facilities were accessed 65 times for children and 25 for adults.

> secure home, clean water, sanitation and safe electricity is an important part of our work. The Safe electricity scheme has rewired 30 families's homes and installed lights, fan and was difficult solar power was provided.

> The government intends to move the families whose homes are on the river banks enabling the river to be widened. This has been planned for 18 months and unless the roof is leaking GHCC has not repaired these homes.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING AND SOCIAL ENTERPRISE

Grace Gecko Vocational Centre for Women

The women's project had a turbulent



year with failed attempts at establishing its own retail outlet. Initially a stall was taken at the Angkor Handicraft Centre but the centre failed to attract

customers.

A stall was then established at the Art Market but after initial good sells it too failed to make a profit. Sales were good at the Shinta Mani Hotel "Made in Cambodia Market" and many useful contacts have been made. The products are available in several retail outlets in Siem Reap. The project continues to be supported by Open Skies, an Australian foundation who fund the instructor and a proportion of the manager's salary.

We are proud to announce membership to the Artisans Association of Cambodia and the Angkor Handicraft Association.







Electricians Training and "Sparkies"

The Electrician Training course completed a second year with 5 students graduating.

A social enterprise "Sparkies" was established in October. The enterprise carries out electrical work for NGOs, small businesses and the local expat community. Two of the first year electricians

are employed as team leaders with the graduates from this year now earning a wage while benefiting from a second year of training. Profits from Sparkies will be used to provide safe electricity to local families.



IT Skills

Funding has been granted for the 2nd year from the Bettina and Michael Jetter Fund for IT classes in the evenings and at weekends.

These classes enable young adults to learn

young adults to learn important skills which will enhance their employment prospects.

FUN TIMES

It's not all hard work, we have fun too!

Having participated in the Giant Puppet Parade for 3 years we decided to give up our place and create our own small version for the villages. Each class made a puppet which was then proudly paraded through the village under police escort. We even paraded through a wedding party.

All the children enjoyed outings with the older and middle classes enjoying the Culture Village. The Croc

and Buffalos enjoyed the swimming pool at Aqua and the Chicks and Bees had fun at Jungle Junction play park. The Phare Circus put on a special performance for the middle school children and 2 other NGOs thanks to sponsorship from Shinta Mani Hotel and Travel Indochina.

Our footballs were runners up in the Globalteer Football League under 10s and 50 students participated in Globalteer Fun Olympics.



Youth Club

The youth club had another successful year with visiting speakers, cooking classes, movie nights and music lessons. They participated in the Angkor Bike Ride for the 2nd year thanks to volunteers and teachers. The number of girls attending was dropping but this was solved by providing transport to the club. The girls who attend are amongst the most vulnerable in the community and greatly benefit from the support offered.






FINANCES - INCOME

Individual donors, supporting schools and grants make up most of GHCC income streams.



2013 saw an increase in revenue from the social enterprises - Grace Gecko Vocational Centre for Women and Sparkies, however expenditure for these 2 projects has been high due to capacity building.

FINANCE - EXPENDITURE



Major expenditure for 2013 consisted of:-

- Constructing a medical room under the social work office and converting the old medical room into a teachers/volunteers resource room
- Paving the area in front of main office
- Constructing "Sparkies" workshop

A 13 month pay scheme was introduced. This is common practice in Cambodia, with the additional month salary awarded to long term staff at Khmer New Year.
